Parkinson's Foundation: Impact by State



In North Carolina, there are an estimated 23,900 people with Parkinson's disease (PD) who are 45 or older. The Parkinson's Foundation has invested \$1,306,600 in **research** to better understand Parkinson's and to ensure **better care** for the North Carolina PD community. As of 2018, in the last 5 years:

- **3,985 people with PD** accessed expert care annually at our **2 Centers of Excellence** (Duke Health Movement Disorders Center | University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Medicine), with **11** enrolled in the *Parkinson's Outcomes Project*, the largest clinical study of PD.
- 2 researchers received research grants for their work to better understand Parkinson's.
- 630 health professionals were trained to provide better care, and help close the gap in PD professional training.

We are equally committed to <u>educating and empowering</u> the PD community in North Carolina. In the last 5 years:

- 1,390 Aware in Care kits prepared people for planned and emergency hospital visits.
- 4 research advocates people with PD and care partners were paired with scientists to make research more effective and efficient.
- **1,770 people with PD** received free services, along with access to exercise and wellness classes through 27 local North Carolina grants, totaling **\$195,790**.
