## Parkinson's Foundation: Impact by State



In Massachusetts, there are an estimated 17,000 people with Parkinson's disease (PD) who are 45 or older. The Parkinson's Foundation has invested \$1,412,400 in research to better understand Parkinson's and to ensure better care for the Massachusetts PD community. As of 2018, in the last 5 years:

- 2,595 people with PD accessed expert care annually at our 2 Centers of Excellence
  (Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center | Massachusetts General Hospital), with 340
  enrolled in the Parkinson's Outcomes Project, the largest clinical study of PD.
- 8 researchers received research grants for their work to better understand Parkinson's.
- 570 health professionals were trained to provide better care, and help close the gap in PD professional training.

We are equally committed to **educating and empowering** the PD community in Massachusetts. In the last 5 years:

- 695 Aware in Care kits prepared people for planned and emergency hospital visits.
- 8 research advocates people with PD and care partners were paired with scientists to make research more effective and efficient.
- 520 people with PD received free services, along with access to exercise and wellness classes through 9 local Massachusetts grants, totaling \$76,650.

Offered professional help through **1,635** calls to information specialists via our Helpline, with **400** referrals to expert care.



Helped people with Parkinson's live well, distributing 9,425 free publications.



Brought **2,000** participants from Massachusetts together, raising **\$61,000** through Moving Day, A Walk for Parkinson's.
